

Editorial: Deleting Expletives

I'm not referring to the 'swear word' expletive. This article is about the 'grammatical' expletive, which is defined as: "a word or phrase used to fill out a sentence or a line of verse without adding to the sense." This includes any form of "there is" or "it is."

"There are, there was, and it is" are expletives that should be eradicated from our writing, especially our fiction. Readers want an author to keep them interested and entertained, yet nothing sucks the



author to keep them interested and entertained, yet nothing sucks the energy out of a sentence like "there was." Those two words are dampeners, rather like a wet blanket: Not useful and not welcome. For example, compare these two opening sentences:

1. There is a ghost in Bob's apartment. 2. A ghost roams Bob's apartment.

Which one is the stronger invitation to keep reading? One problem with "there is" is that it delays the intrigue, the payoff. Check out your descriptions, especially for setting, where deleting these passive expletives pays big dividends. Instead of writing, "There were six candles atop the mantle," delete the boring expletive, add an active verb, and rearrange the sentence. Now you have something like, "Five red candles crowded the center of the mantle." Or, "There were numerous flaws in his schematic" can become, "His schematic contained numerous flaws," or, "I noticed numerous flaws in his schematic."

"There is" and "it is" expletives do not represent grammatical errors, but they do indicate a lack of style and efficiency in the writing. So let's activate our writing by deleting them!

LUW Writing Contest


<u>Deadline:</u> May 19 – That's midnight Saturday. The annual creative writing contest categories include Fiction, Nonfiction and Poetry.
