Editorial: Flash Fiction

In public school many kids called me Flash because of my last name. Back in the 50s (a super long time ago) Flash Gordon shows were still on TV. Now flash forward to 2014 when I wrote my first Flash Fiction story. It won an Honorable Mention in the LUW contest. This year I entered my second Flash story in a contest and it took first place. I think I'm getting the hang of this.



In the LUW creative writing contest, the categories that receive the most submissions are Flash Fiction and 1st Chapter. Most Flash fiction stories don't do well because the authors don't understand what's expected in this genre. It's not just about writing a piece that's only a 1000 words long.

This approach works for many Flash authors: First think of a flashpoint, or plot point, and build out from there in both directions. Include limited or no backstory, only enough characterization to pique interest, limit the number of characters, focus on powerful images, add a simile or metaphor, and go for emotional impact at the end.

For me, writing a short story is fairly easy, but in its original form my stories are always too long. That's where a good thesaurus comes in handy (or Thesaurus.com). I don't use obscure or super-long words, but I try to use the right word, going for intense instead of wordy. Remember that Flash stories should end with a poignant sentence that hits the reader in the gut. Many times this final sentence makes readers want to reread the story to experience that final punch again. If you haven't written Flash stories, you might want try it. Short short stories are popular now; they're just long enough for people to read on their phone or tablet during a break.

Member Article: Three Reasons to Review by Edward Massey

Last year, either as a judge or reviewer, I read 41 novels published in 2015. For this article I decided to justify myself by offering three reasons to review:

- 1. <u>It helps your writing the way a critique group does</u>. When reading to review, you have to look for good writing along with certain aspects of the novel. Later, when you read your own writing, you cannot help look at your own work with the same critical eye.
- 2. <u>It helps your writing career by building a platform</u>. Not many people remember the names of reviewers or judges, but each bit of recognition helps. It also helps build relationships among peers in the writing industry.
- 3. <u>It helps your writing for publication by forcing you to develop synopsis skills.</u> I hate writing the obligatory synopsis that goes in a query letter, but I like the challenge of catching a novel in a few words during a review. Now if only I could step back and write a review of my own story before struggling to write the synopsis.

So I encourage you to read for others and for your own writing, especially since I cannot stop myself.
