

### **Publishing Info and Opportunities**

▶ The Big 5 Trade Book Publishers: First a little backstory about me: In the 1990s I was a textbook field sales rep for Simon & Schuster covering Utah and Nevada. S&S had recently purchased Prentice-Hall; they had already purchased several other textbook publishers including Silver-Burdett and Ginn. So when I walked into a school to introduce myself to teachers and administrators, I stated my name and that I was representing Simon & Schuster, Prentice-Hall, Silver-Burdett and Ginn. The whole thing – several times a day. I thought it was funny – as did most of the people I ran into.

S&S and Random House and a few others kept purchasing other publishing houses until now there are just five main book publishers in the U.S. This is a quick article about the Big 5 Publishers: https://www.thebalance.com/the-big-five-trade-book-publishers-2800047

- Sky Horse Publishing: Publishers Weekly called them the fastest-growing small publisher in America. The company isn't too small though – they do have 18 imprints. They publish non-fiction and children's books. Check them out: <u>http://www.skyhorsepublishing.com/</u>

- Skybound Books: In 2017 Atria Books, an imprint of Simon & Schuster, and Skybound Entertainment, responsible for hit TV shows, comics and graphic novels, announced a new co-publishing imprint, Skybound Books, which will focus on science fiction, fantasy and horror properties. Initially they will publish four to six titles a year from original works of fiction and nonfiction. This is good news; it will give authors more options.
